Phone scams impersonating Australian businesses and government agencies are on the rise.

The Australian Cyber Security Centre and Australian Competition and Consumer Commission’s Scamwatch have received an increased number of reports in the last five days of remote access scams. Members of the public have reported receiving calls from cybercriminals pretending to be from telecommunication companies, government agencies including the Department of Home Affairs and parcel delivery companies. What are small modular reactors and what makes them different?

So, what are small modular reactors, or SMRs? The term refers to a class of modern reactors that are

essentially “small”, and each unit can be manufactured in a factory. They are “modular” in the sense that each unit can be assembled next to another and scaled up or down to meet the local electricity needs. They are also designed to “plug in” to existing power networks and therefore can essentially replace an aging power station with a modern, reliable, and zero-emissions power source. [Details.](#)
