Clinical trials begin for flu vaccine-coated Vaxxas patches

Brisbane-based vaccine delivery technology Vaxxas has announced initiation of a Phase 1 clinical trial for flu shots administered by the company's high-density microarray patch (HD-MAP.) According to a statement from the company on Friday, the trial will take place at three University of the Sunshine Coast's clinical research sites – in Brisbane, Morayfield and Sippy Down – using a <u>seasonal influenza vaccine</u> <u>quadrivalent</u> (IIV4) candidate made by "an undisclosed, world leading biopharmaceutical and medical device company."

Algorithm boosts imaging resolution of hydrogen fuel cells

UNSW Sydney researchers have <u>developed an algorithm</u> to significantly enhance images of hydrogen fuel cells, with potential future applications in medical scanning.The algorithm produces high-resolution modelled images from lowerresolution micro X-ray computerised tomography (CT). The new process, detailed in a paper published in Nature Communications, has been tested on individual hydrogen fuel cells to accurately model the interior in precise detail and potentially improve their efficiency.

Endeavour Awards 2022: Australian Industrial Product of the Year — Successful Endeavours

The number one way that plumbers die on Australian worksites is electrocution. <u>The</u> <u>Plumb Guard</u> by *Successful Endeavours* was originally designed as a self-contained unit to check that no hazardous voltages were present. The latest version includes Bluetooth IoT technology to connect to a mobile phone so that hazard alerts can also be provided to site supervisors.

AICIS approval will allow significant scaling up, says Graphene Manufacturing Group

Graphene Manufacturing Group has announced "full and final approval" of its products under the Australian Industrial Chemicals Introduction Scheme (AICIS), an

agency within the federal department of health, allowing for a significant increase in production. The Brisbane-based and Toronto-listed company said on Monday that the <u>approval covered coatings</u>, automotive lubricants and the company's graphene aluminium-ion batteries, and permitted total production of up to ten tonnes per annum of graphene powder.

Reviewing the construction industry's commercial model

It seems that Clough's administrators have quickly learned construction's dirty little secret:the <u>commercial model</u> for major construction projects is broken and not benefitting anybody,least of all the industry itself. The nature of construction is that contractors and subcontractors price projects months before actual costs are known. They are given only a few months to quantify complex risks on multi-billion-dollar projects and unsurprisingly, despite their best efforts, there is often a difference between the initial budget and the actual cost. In the current inflation environment, that difference can be huge.
